In chapter 1, on page 13, it states "... for Calpurnia rarely commented on the ways of white people." Calpurnia rarely speaks about the ways of white people due to the social hierarchy in the norms of society. It would have cost her her job at the very least or her life at most to remark on the ways of those who <sup>considered</sup> were superior to her. Scout and Jem may not have been old enough to understand that her silence in this area was largely due to the unwritten rules of society. They were not yet trained in all of the social norms of the time. That moment exemplifies the part of the theme that deals with social justice and the development of characters.

Ch.1 p.14	Boo looks scary and behaves like a lunatic.	This quote shows how young and impressionable Jem and Scout are. It also shows Jem's imagination and the kids propensity to believe anything adults might tell them.
"Your shamin' him, Miss Caroline. Walter hasn't got a quarter at home to bring you, and you can't use any store wood."	Miss Caroline was embarrassing Walter by trying to make him borrow money from her because Walter couldn't pay her back.	This quote shows Scout's honesty and bravery. She speaks her mind and tries to be helpful.
